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this collection reclaims a vast body of long neglected latin texts from the middle ages and the renaissance and examines how they represent the feminine and the female body the authors explore the ideological values explicitly encoded by the feminine in these texts other less articulated values implied by the feminine and the role of the classical tradition in communicating those values the examination of women both as subjects and as rhetorical constructions in medieval and renaissance latin literature sheds light on the larger dialogue about feminism occurring throughout the humanities in addition the inclusion of a new body of texts and the rescue of others from their present isolation will expand the reach of classical and humanist scholarship traditional studies of latin literature end around the beginning of the fifth century c e despite the fact that latin continued to be the dominant literary and intellectual language until at least the latter half of the sixteenth century thus most classicists ignore over one thousand years of the latin literary tradition few non classicists read latin comfortably and fewer still have a detailed understanding of the history of classical latin literature nevertheless a knowledge of this history was assumed by most neo latin writers as well as their contemporaries who wrote in the vernacular this collection supplies tools to examine more completely the construction and application of gender in both latin and vernacular texts of the middle ages and the renaissance

just as class is a key term for understanding modern europe so hierarchy and order are the key terms for the earlier period these exceptional essays by some of the leading historians in the field are designed to allow students to get a better grasp on this critical subject life in the late medieval and early modern periods was simply organized in a very different way to that of the industrial or post industrial society we are accustomed to each essay tackles a different aspect of this european wide experience whether looking at the nobility the gentry the commons or the religious castes the contributors greatly increase our ability to understand the complex and fascinating phenomenon of how society ticks and how it is perceived by its members to tick

although studies of specific time concepts expressed in renaissance philosophy and literature have not been lacking few art historians have endeavored to meet the challenge in the visual arts this book presents a multifaceted picture of the dynamic concepts of time and temporality in medieval and renaissance art adopted in speculative ecclesiastical socio political propagandist moralistic and poetic contexts it has been assumed that time was conceived in a different way by those living in the renaissance as compared to their medieval predecessors changing perceptions of time an increasingly secular approach the sense of self determination rooted in the practical use and control

of time and the perception of time as a threat to human existence and achievements are demonstrated through artistic media chapters dealing with time in classical and medieval philosophy and art are followed by studies that focus on innovative aspects of renaissance iconography

a profusely illustrated review of history including the middle ages in europe the rise of the maya incas and aztecs in the americas the mongols and ming dynasty in china

reflecting a variety of scholarly interests this volume includes articles that range addressing africans in elizabeth london to chapel stagings to the theory and practice of domestic tragedy it also includes essays on the historical and theoretical issues relating to the evolution of dramatic texts and women at the theater

based on the study of over 500 surviving manuscript school books this comprehensive 2001 study of the curriculum of school education in medieval and renaissance italy contains some surprising conclusions robert black s analysis finds that continuity and conservatism not innovation characterize medieval and renaissance teaching the study of classical texts in medieval italian schools reached its height in the twelfth century this was followed by a collapse in the thirteenth century an effect on school teaching of the growth of university education this collapse was only gradually reversed in the two centuries that followed it was not until the later 1400s that humanists began to have a significant impact on education scholars of european history of renaissance studies and of the history of education will find that this deeply researched and broad ranging book challenges much inherited wisdom about education humanism and the history of ideas

looking at the plays of shakespeare kyd and webster this book presents a new perspective on early modern drama grounded upon three original interrelated points the author explores how the motif of the mourning woman on the early modern stage embodies the cultural trauma of the reformation in england brings to light the extent to which the figures of early modern drama recall those of the recent medieval past and addresses how these representations embody actual mourning practices that were after the reformation increasingly viewed as disturbing

with contributions from a range of internationally known early music scholars and performers tess knighton and david fallows provide a lively new survey of music and culture in europe from the beginning of the christian era to 1600 fifty essays comment on the social historical theoretical and performance contexts of the music and musicians of the period to offer fresh perspectives on musical styles research sources and
